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HISTORICAL CONTEXT OF SYLVIA PLATH'S LADY LAZARUS

THE POEM "LADY LAZARUS" WAS WRITTEN IN 1962, A YEAR BEFORE SYLVIA PLATH'S TRAGIC DEATH. DURING THIS PERIOD, PLATH WAS IMMERSSED IN HER CREATIVE PEAK, PRODUCING SOME OF HER MOST INFLUENTIAL WORK. THE POEM REFLECTS HER ONGOING STRUGGLES WITH DEPRESSION AND SUICIDAL IDEATION, THEMES THAT PERMEATE MUCH OF HER WRITING. THE CULTURAL ATMOSPHERE OF THE EARLY 1960S, PARTICULARLY THE EXPECTATIONS PLACED ON WOMEN, HEAVILY INFLUENCED PLATH'S WORK. SYLVIA PLATH'S PERSONAL BACKGROUND

GORNICK'S CANDID STORYTELLING ABOUT LOVE, LOSS, AND SELF-DISCOVERY COMPLEMENTS THE EMOTIONAL COMPLEXITY FOUND IN "LADY LAZARUS." THE BOOK ENRICHES THE UNDERSTANDING OF FAMILIAL AND PERSONAL STRUGGLES IN A FEMINIST CONTEXT.

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
